

A Round - Topped Wooden Stela of Iwf-aaw

The Priest of Amon in Ipet-Iswt

A round-topped wooden stela, dating from the reign of king Takeloth, of the Twenty-second Dynasty (1). It measures 30.2 cm. hight, and 22.0 cm. wide. The stela was found in a tomb-shaft at Gourna, and is now in Cairo museum (Journal d'entree No. 65756).


The Stela is rather badly damaged, due to the flaking of the painted stucco surface. Originally the upper part of the stela was framed by the figure of the Sky-goddess Nut, whose arched body followed the curve of the top. Her head and body are destroyed, but her legs and hands may be seen at the left and right of the scene.


Below the Goddess is a scene showing the deceased standing in the presence of the God Osiris. The deceased faces ______, and is clad in a kilt which reaches from his waist to midway between his knees and the ground and which has its everlapping edge ornamented with a fringe. He also wears a narrow, ritualist's stole.

Between the deceased and Osiris is an offering table, laden with conventionalized slices of bread. Under it are the signs:



Osiris is standing, and facing _____. He is in his usual form of a mumnified man, wearing the crown of Upper Egypt, flanked by ostrich feathers, and holding the w3s-sceptre. Behind him is a large sign of the West


At the top of the scene are the lower parts of five vertical lines of inscription, which read:

The half of the stela is occupied by four horizontal lines of inscription, reading



(1) "An [offering] which the king gives (and) [Geb] the hereditary prince of the Gods, may he give all offerings and all provisions (2) for the Ka of the priest of Amon is Ipt-Iswt, Iwf. aaw, justified (3) the son of the singer of Amon, Hor wdja, justified, he says (4) ... Ankht, the daughter of the King, the Lord of the Two Lands, Takeloth, who lives".

The princess mentioned in the last line, is perhaps the mother of the owner of the stela.
